tain each and every day. I'm grateful to live in an amazing region with some of the best people. I am grateful for our fantastic board, all of our members near and far for working to create positive change in our communities and abroad, and the opportunity to lead our club this year.

November is special for many reasons, but it is also very important as it is Rotary Foundation month. If you recall, the Rotary Foundation Chair for our District, Cheryl Peterson, recently presented on this topic at a September meeting. Cheryl reminded us that the Rotary Foundation is the arm of Rotary that transforms our gifts into service projects to change lives both close to home, through district grants and around the world, through global grants.

Locally, our District was awarded \$45,655 to clubs who submitted a district grant application for a service project in their local community. Of those, 21 were fully-funded projects with seven being partially funded. The impact of those projects meant that lives were touched by addressing the following: Literacy, exercise, food insecurity, hygiene and health, community improvement, home and community safety, environmental improvements, and winter gear and holiday support for needy families.

All officers are nominated for one-year terms, and the two (2) members of the Board of Directors are nominated for three-year terms. The presiding officer at the annual meeting shall also accept more nominations from the floor for each office. The Club shall have six (6) Directors with staggered terms; two (2) of the Directors are elected each year for a three-year term."

We approved \$3.000 towards a computer lab for an after school program by the Caregiving Network in the Grove Park neighborhood. We also approved \$150 for Jewls the Clown at an Early Head Start program. Finally, we are sending \$5,000 to Midland Kids First to help acquire a variety of supplies to support their programs at the Juvenile Care Center including bikes, fishing poles, and kayaks. We thank Bart Thompson for his many years of service as he rotates off of the board and welcome Matt Granzo as our newest board member. Year end giving time is fast approaching. Salvation Army to donate directly to this effort.


There are 36 time slots available, so guarantee your slot by signing up early. Families are welcome! If you

For the past seven years, the Salvation Army Fundraiser has been dedicated in memory of former Rotarian, Jon Barckholtz, who died in 2014. Jon was born with spina bifida, and due to the illness, was institutionalized for twenty years. He endured abuse and neglect before being released. Instead of being bitter about this experience, he used the rest of his life to help others and fought to get such institutions in Michigan closed. He also fought so people with developmental disabilities


could get support to be contributing members of the community. He worked at Target for 13 years and served on the People First and Arc of Midland boards. When he joined Rotary



in 2010, he not only brought his wonderful smile, and his commitment to service to our club, but he also taught us so much about tenacity, strong will, strength, compassion, forgiveness, and love of all people. Since his death, the Midland Noon Rotary Club continues its longtime commitment to Salvation Army Fundraising in his honor in recognition of his contributions to our club and the community.

Last year we raised \$1,802 in two full days of bell ringing and another \$800 from member donations sent to me directly for a fundraising grand total of \$2,602. This was \$2,000 less than 2019 perhaps due to the financial challenges of the pandemic and the fewer people getting out into the community. For the sake of those in need, I hope we can do better this year. Salvation Army programs include the following: thousands of Midland County residents (our own neighbors and friends) find help from The Salvation Army in meeting their basic needs for food, medicine, or a safe, heated home to live in. Hundreds of people receive a hot Thanksgiving meal. Hundreds of children are given coats and gifts at Christmas time. Hundreds of kids in our community attend SHARE Day Camp that provide a fun, safe and af-

fordable place in the summer and receive assistance with other year-round projects.

While currently serving on the Community Needs Committee, Membership Committee and Midland Rotary Foundation Board of Directors, this involvement has been very educational and satisfying, both professionally and personally.

#### **COMMITTEES**

- **Community Needs**: Meets the financial needs primarily for Midland County youth-oriented projects that might otherwise fall through the cracks.
- **Executive Committee**: Charged with developing goals and objectives for the overall Club in coordination with National and International goals and objectives. (*Please note, this committee is voted on at the Annual Meeting.*)
- **Fellowship and Service**: Charged with committee-wide events which help to promote the image of Rotary and our motto of "Service above Self". Incorporates the following subcommittees:

Midland Blooms; Pancake Supper; Salvation Army Bell Ringers; Seniors Christmas Luncheon; Tridge Walk

• Focus on Youth: Charged with acting in the best interests of the youth in our Club and community, ensuring they maintain their basic human rights while aiding in skill development in all area of life. Incorporates the following subcommittees:

Advocate for Youth; Camp Rotary – RYLA; Interact; Rotary Youth Exchange – RYE

• Fundraising: Charged with developing and promoting events intended to create awareness of Rotary and generating income for Rotary initiatives aligned with the Community Needs Committee. Fundraising incorporates the following subcommittees:

Golf Outing; Riverdays; Rotary International Foundation

• **Grove Park**: Charged with conducting twice-a-year clean-up days, planning activities to benefit residents of the Midtown neighborhood such as children's activities at "Gather at Grove", and attending neighborhood association meetings and park-related planning meetings to understand neighborhood needs.

- International Initiatives: Responsible for identifying, prioritizing, selecting opportunities, and then organizing the Club's implementation response including funding and staffing. These projects are aligned with Rotary International's priorities and include polio eradication, improving water and sanitation, and vocational training activities.
- Member Orientation and Social: Functions to orient and integrate new members into the Club; introduce them to other members, to our customs, and committees; and help them navigate the process from red badge to blue badge. Also plans and executes social events for the entire Club to help foster social ties and provide Club enjoyment. Incorporates the following subcommittees:

New Member Orientation and Social Events

• Midland Rotary Foundation: The Midland Rotary Foundation (MRF) is a separate 501(c) (3) charitable organization, established in 1977 so that Rotarians could make tax deductible contributions that would benefit the Midland area community. The current \$900,000 endowment allows the MRF to donate \$35,000 to \$40,000 in scholarships and grants each year, mostly benefitting disadvantaged youth. The MRF has its own bylaws and 11-member Board of Directors (drawn from the Midland Rotary Club) that meets four to six times each year to evaluate applications and award grants. (Please note that membership is restricted.) The MRF Board of Directors consists of:

Tim Dyste (Chair), Kellie Bos (Treasurer), Scott Withrow (Secretary), Dale Davis, Jim Nigro, Carol Feider, Bart Thompson, Tawny Ryan Nelb, J. Dee Brooks, John Haag, and Melissa Barnard.

- **Peacebuilding**: Responsible for identifying, evaluating, and selecting opportunities for peacebuilding initiatives locally and globally through collaboration with other organizations. Aligning projects with Rotary International's priorities, specifically the focus area of "Promoting Peace".
- **Programs**: Charged with overseeing the programs presented at our regular meetings. Incorporates the following subcommittees:

Attendance; Business Briefing; Cashiers; Humor Moment; Invocations; Meeting Logistics; Music; Planning and Scheduling; Technology

- **Public Image**: Responsible for communicating with members, liaison with media, and promoting Rotary events.
- **Scholarship Fund**: Responsible for publicizing, providing, and receiving applications, and selecting the recipients of the various scholarships that were established by families of late club members, which include the following:
  - o William Dixon Scholarship 3 awards of \$1,200 each
  - o Herbert H. Hardy Scholarship 2 awards of \$2,500 each
  - o C.A. Campbell Scholarship 1 award of \$1,300

- **Spirit of Rotary:** Charged with identifying young adults who represent the ideals of Rotary, selecting candidates for the Spirit of Rotary award, and providing the award ceremony held in the spring of each year.
- **Stewards of Rotary**: Maintains the history of the Club and outreach to members who may be suffering from long-term or debilitating illnesses. Provides mentoring for younger members. Incorporates the following subcommittees:

Club History; Member Care; Mentoring

- **Supporting the Environment:** Responsible for aligning projects for our Club that strengthen the conservation and protection of natural resources, advance ecological sustainability, and foster harmony between communities and the environment.
- Wellbeing through Communication & Connection: The outcomes of this committee are:
  - 1. Within Rotary: To increase Rotary membership through recruitment, retention, and engagement using the framework of Wellbeing at the Me, We, and Us levels
  - 2. Within our Community: To help us develop tools and strategies to use in difficult, uncomfortable conversations with each other, within our groups, and within our community.


#### **GIVE TO END POLIO**
