Loving our enemies

February is the month when many celebrate Valentine's Day. Traditionally, Valentine's Day is when lovers express their affection with greetings and gifts. It is easy to love those who love us. How do we respond when someone does not show love but rather dislikes us?

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. talked about this in his speech entitled Loving Your Enemies. He stated, "...others aren't going to like you because your skin is a little darker than theirs. So that some people aren't going to like you. They're going to dislike you, not because of something that you've done to them, but because of various jealous reactions and other reactions that are so prevalent in human nature."

When we think about diversity, equity and inclusion, it means leaning into conversations with those who may dislike us, not because of anything we've done but because of biases they may hold. Biases are prevalent in human nature.

The understanding and goodwill we can build through Rotary can allow us to better recognize and overcome those biases.

One of Rotary's causes is promoting peace. That may mean learning to love our enemies. The Rotary International website states that we refuse to accept conflict as a way of life.

The website goes on to say that Rotary creates environments of peace. Rotary has stepped into situations where groups have traditionally been enemies of one another. Creating environments of peace takes authentic conversations with those different from us.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. offered some further insights in his speech. He states, "There's another reason why you should love your enemies, and that is because hate distorts the personality of the hater. We usually think of what hate does for the individual hated or the individuals hated or the groups hated. But it is even more tragic, it is even more ruinous and injurious to the individual who hates. You just begin hating somebody, and you will begin to do irrational things. You can't see straight when you hate. You can't walk straight when you hate. You can't stand upright. Your vision is distorted. There is nothing more tragic than to see an individual whose heart is filled with hate."

Rotary creates environments of peace

As a humanitarian organization, peace is a cornerstone of our mission. The Rotary International website states we believe when people work to create peace in their communities, that change can have a global effect.

By carrying out service projects and supporting peace fellowships and scholarships, our members take action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, discrimination, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources. Our commitment to peacebuilding today answers new challenges: how we can make the greatest possible impact and how we can achieve our vision of lasting change. We are approaching the concept of peace with greater cohesion and inclusivity, broadening the scope of what we mean by peacebuilding, and finding more ways for people to get involved.

Rotary creates environments where peace can happen.

Our 4 roles in promoting peace

Rotary and its members are:

Practitioners: Fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, improving the health of mothers and children, supporting education, and growing local economies directly builds the optimal conditions for peaceful societies.

Educators: Rotary Peace Centers have trained over 1,300 peace fellows to become effective catalysts for peace through careers in government, education, and international organizations.

Mediators: Our members have negotiated humanitarian ceasefires in areas of conflict to allow polio vaccinators to reach children who are at risk.

Advocates: Our members have an integral role as respected, impartial participants during peace processes and in post-conflict reconstruction. We focus on creating communities and convening groups that are connected, inclusive, and resilient.

We seem to come back time and again to the Rotary four-way test. Living that test does not leave room for hate. If it is the truth, if it is fair to all concerned, if it builds goodwill and better friendships and if it is beneficial to all concerned, there's no place for hate in that kind of living.

Dr. King summed this all up beautifully when he stated, "Now there is a final reason I think that Jesus says, 'Love your enemies.' It is this: that love has within it a redemptive power. And there is a power there that eventually transforms individuals. That's why Jesus says, 'Love your enemies.' Because if you hate your enemies, you have no way to redeem and to transform your enemies. But if you love your enemies, you will discover that at the very root of love is the power of redemption. You just keep loving people and keep loving them, even though they're mistreating you. ... That's love, you see. It is redemptive, and this is why Jesus says love. There's something about love that builds up and is creative."

As Valentine's Day is celebrated this year, let's look for ways to transform our communities by showing our love and care for those around us. As Rotarians, let's live out our value of peacebuilding by being inclusive of others.
