

February Is Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month



Rotary's Approach:

We see peace not as an abstract concept but as a living, dynamic expression of human development.

Peacebuilding is a cornerstone of our mission as a humanitarian service organization, and it is one of our seven areas of focus — the channels of activity through which our members make their mark on the world. Our programs, grants and fellowships focus on creating environments where peace can be built and maintained.

Rotary believes that if concerned citizens work together to create peace locally, lasting change can happen globally.

To achieve this cornerstone of Rotary's mission as a humanitarian service organization, Rotary International has established four roles in promoting peacebuilding:

Rotary and Its Members Are:

- **Practitioners:** Our work fighting disease, providing clean water and sanitation, improving the health of mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies, and supporting the environment directly *builds* the optimal conditions for peaceful societies.
- **Educators:** Our Rotary Peace Centers have trained over 1,300 peace scholars/fellows to *become effective catalysts for peace through careers in government, education, and international organizations.*
- **Mediators:** Our members have negotiated humanitarian ceasefires in areas of conflict to allow polio vaccinators to reach children who are at risk. The eradication of polio remains the goal of the highest order for Rotary. We can continue to *apply the lessons we have learned in fighting polio to COVID-19 response efforts*.

Advocates: Our members have an integral role as respected, impartial participants during peace processes and in post-conflict reconstruction. We *focus on creating communities and convening groups that are connected, inclusive, and resilient* (Rotary.org, January 31, 2022).

Our Club, starting with Kevin Kendrick's presidency followed by Tawny Nelb's, has strived to serve not only locally, but also globally. This overview would not be complete without the reminder that Rotary International recently approved a Global Grant of \$83,800 to a consortium consisting of four Rotary districts and four Rotary clubs across two states and two continents to support sanitation, solar power, and teaching/learning technology projects for two schools in rural Uganda. What a wonderful example of global collaboration!

Although the global need is tremendous, we cannot ignore the ongoing needs locally. Our Peacebuilding Committee, chartered in 2017-18, is a "meet as needed" committee responsible for (1) Identifying, evaluating, and selecting opportunities for peacebuilding initiatives both locally and globally in collaboration with the Midland Chapter of the Nonviolent Peaceforce and other like-minded entities and (2) Aligning projects with Rotary International's priorities, specifically the focus area of Promoting Peace through peacebuilding and conflict transformation.

February Is Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month

Prior Accomplishments:

1. Youth Voice for Peace – Chartered an Interact Club and offered programming in partnership with The ROCK and its "Discover You" curriculum. Project is on hold given challenges of Covid.

Global Grant for Peace within South Sudan – Aligned with Nonviolent Peaceforce Midland Chapter and NewGen Peacebuilders to work with Rotarians in Juba, SS. Project is on hold given challenges of Covid; e.g., borders have been closed.

2021 Accomplishments:

1. Continued our strong partnership with Nonviolent Peaceforce Midland Chapter (NPMC).

In partnership with NPMC, applied for and received designation as an International City of Peace (ICP). Midland will be joining other Cities of Peace around the globe, engaging other peace teams, creating an action plan, implementing on-the-ground work for peace, and engaging through ICP's program to build a global network of peace-builders. The goal is to have 1,000 Cities of Peace by 2025. Midland is the 343rd ICP. http:// internationalcitiesofpeace.org

2022-23 Goals:

1. Update membership. Those on the original committee will soon receive an email asking if they want to continue their membership – or ask to be removed from the distribution list.

Engage Rotarians in ICP-related events and activities. Since a yearly proclamation affirming commitment and involvement is required by City Council, we will have lots of opportunities to further our peacebuilding efforts locally.

February 17 Program (via Zoom):



Reinvigorating our Peacebuilding Committee during the month of Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution month is only one tangible thing happening during February. On February 17, we have a peace-focused program. Katrina Kalcic had been selected as District 6310's 2021 Peace Scholar/Fellow and planned to study at Uppsala University in Uppsala, Sweden. She was then offered a Rotary Global Grant to attend Oxford University's one-year intensive master's program. This particular master's degree will provide the practical skills and knowledge for her focus areas of delivery of safe drinking water in Uganda and ending violence against women in a broader context.

These colors also represented the color of flags and banners used by suffragettes in the United Kingdom in the earliest days of that movement.
