Are you part of a Midland Rotary committee?

Our members donate significant volunteer time each year beyond our weekly club meetings to meet the challenge of "Service above Self". That explains how we accomplish so much every year and how the bulk of the work gets done. If you are a newer member, please consider increasing your level of involvement; or if you are a long-time member and would like to change your focus, please check out the variety of options available in our committee structure. Community Needs (Co-Chair Caleb Hortop, caleb.hortop@gmail.com and Co-Chair Stacey Gannon, staceygannon302@gmail.com): Meets the financial needs primarily for Midland County youth-oriented projects that might otherwise fall through the cracks.

Midland Rotary Foundation (Chair Timothy W. Dyste, timdyste@outlook.com): The Midland Rotary Foundation is a separate 501(c)(3) charitable organization, established in 1977 so that Rotarians could make tax deductible contributions that would benefit the Midland-area community. The current \$900,000 endowment allows the MRF to donate \$35,000 to \$40,000 in scholarships and grants each year, mostly benefitting disadvantaged youth. The MRF has its own bylaws and an 11-member Board of Directors (drawn from the Midland Rotary Club) that meets four to six times each year to evaluate applications and award grants. Membership is restricted.

Scholarship Fund (Chair Reva Curry, revacurry@delta.edu): Responsible for publicizing, providing, and receiving applications; and selecting the recipients of the various scholarships that were established by families of late club members, which include the following:

- · William Dixon Scholarship 3 awards of \$1,200 each
- · Herbert H. Hardy Scholarship 2 awards of \$2,500 each
- C.A. Campbell Scholarship 1 award of \$1,300

Spirit of Rotary (NEED NEW CHAIR): Charged with identifying young adults who represent the ideals of Rotary, selecting candidates for the Spirit of Rotary award, and providing the award ceremony held in the spring of each year.

Rotarians join Midland peace party

We Midlanders have so much to be grateful for! On Saturday, Sept. 24, Creative 360 — in partnership with Nonviolent Peaceforce Midland Chapter and Midland Rotary — hosted a Peace Block Party complete with music, games, activities, art, face painting, food trucks, and of course information.

This inclusive, family-friendly, community-centered event was designed to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of Nonviolent Peaceforce, celebrate Midland's 2021 designation as an International City of Peace, and celebrate our Proclamation Renewal recognizing: "City of Peace Day in the City of Midland and encourage citizens to foster positive expressions of peace, allowing humanity to flourish and providing avenues for more people to achieve their full potential" (approved by the mayor and City Council on Sept. 12).

The event also served as a kick-off to Neighboring Week. As C360 Director Laura Vosejpka said, "It is such a perfect kickoff to Neighboring Week—neighboring is the first step in creating an inclusive City of Peace."

We are very proud to be an internationally recognized City of Peace. You may be wondering what a City of Peace is. It is a city that is recognized as one on its way to becoming a more peaceful city through a formal application process to International Cities of Peace www.internationalcitiesofpeace.org. It's also recognizing a community's past achievements, current initiatives, and future plans for peacebuilding.

Our global challenges are unprecedented: climate change, the ongoing pandemic, the challenges to democracy, the threat of a nuclear event. International Cities of Peace defines the consensus values of peace around the world as SAFETY, PROSPERITY, AND QUALITY OF LIFE FOR ALL. Compare this to Midland's vision: Together. Forward. Bold. An exceptional place where everyone thrives. Aren't they similar?

As an International City of Peace, we are part of a global network of peacebuilders. Our commitment to practical peacebuilding is strong! It means teaching nonviolence and the Golden Rule: Do for others as you would have them do for you.

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Needed now more than ever: Pies for Polio set for Oct. 24

We will be partnering with Grand Traverse Pie Company for our annual "Pies for Polio" campaign that our club holds to bring awareness to eradication efforts and raise money for the Polio Plus Fund.

This event — which is set for Oct. 24 — is especially needed this year, as there has been a resurgence of polio in the United States and around the globe.

Recently, Mike McGovern, Rotary International Polio Plus Committee Chair, reached out to Rotary leaders after the U.S. appeared on the official list of countries with circulating polio cases. The cases have been detected in counties surrounding New York, where a man was first identified to have polio in June. The CDC has announced it will conduct additional wastewater sampling in other communities across the nation that have low rates of vaccination.

"The USA uses IPV for its polio immunizations and has a high rate of around 90% coverage, thus, the concerns are tempered somewhat," McGovern stated in a letter to Rotary leaders. "But we still have areas in the United States and around the world where there are low rates of polio vaccination coverage, and this case reminds us that until we eradicate polio, any country anywhere in the world can see a resurgence of polio."

McGovern is reminding all Rotarians that their Rotary PolioPlus program intends to reach every last child — and that together we will end polio.

"Rotarians' financial support remains crucial as well as advocacy to promote polio vaccinations in every community," he stated. "It is also hoped that all Rotary clubs and Rotaractors will undertake activities during October and November to reemphasize to members and the community that polio eradication is Rotary's top humanitarian priority and polio could return to any community."

Again, together we will end polio, McGovern stressed.

MacDouell talks about moving from abstract inclusivity to robust hospitality stating, "When we extend hospitality, we create space for reconciliation, enemy-love, resource-sharing, and deep listening to be practiced and experienced. The act of hospitality helps us to identify, embrace, and celebrate the common humanity that we share with others."

That's a beautiful way to look at neighboring. While neighboring week may officially be ended, neighboring can be celebrated on a daily basis.
